St. Ulrich Workshop on Democratising Agricultural Research for Food Sovereignty and Peasant Agrarian Cultures

September 22nd (Afternoon) – 25th, 2013

If you are working or concerned about:

- Envisioning an alternative model of agricultural and rural development, a new modernity with vibrant peasant cultures in Europe and throughout the world
- Democratizing food and agricultural research to ensure that its directions and governance are decided first and foremost by farmers and citizens rather than by corporations
- Focusing on food sovereignty and models of production based on agroecology, peasant control on local seeds and animal breeds, and local institutions
- Giving the excluded a voice that counts in food and agricultural policy making, including in agenda setting for research
- Processes of food sovereignty that allow farmers and other citizens to exercise their right to decide what food and agricultural policies they want

And you are:

- Looking for methodologies to listen to, and include -, the voices of peasants and indigenous peoples' in policy making and in the choice of technologies and models of production
- Seeking ways to create an impact on mainstream policies and democratize agricultural research for the public good – putting citizens at the centre of decision making instead of corporations
- Working to strengthen horizontal networks of autonomous, farmer-to-farmer research and innovation systems
- ➤ Building alliances and networks to strengthen peasant cultures and exchanges for food sovereignty in Europe and in Africa, Asia, and Latin America.

You are kindly invited to share your experience and thinking by participating in this European Food Sovereignty Workshop at St. Ulrich from 22nd (evening) to 25th of October 2012.

Aims of the workshop

- To enable peasant representatives (women and men) from the Andes, West Africa, Iran and South Asia to share their experiences on the process and outcomes of the *Democratising Food and Agricultural Research* initiative (www.excludedvoices.org) and present their views on what is needed to secure their future livelihoods, rights, and culture.
- > To facilitate an exchange of experiences, viewpoints, and visions of desirable futures between European practitioners (farmers and activists) and the peasant representatives from Africa, Asia and Latin America
- ➤ To deliberate on topics of mutual concern and develop strategies for the re-creation of model(s) of agricultural research and development that can strengthen agrarian peasant cultures for the well being of people and nature.
- To identify possible convergences, alliances, and synergies between organizations and farmer networks to strengthen food sovereignty in Europe with the outcomes of the *Democratising Food and Agricultural Research* initiative in West Africa, South Asia, West Asia, and the Andean Altiplano.
- ➤ To develop joint approaches and strategies for i) the democratization of agricultural research, ii) the recovery of a vibrant peasant cultures in rural development, and iii) opening safe spaces for communication and action for peasant farmers and food consumers/citizens working for food sovereignty throughout the world.

There will be a 4 days mutual learning trip to visit German farmers and activists in SW-Germany for the participants coming from India, Iran, Mali, Peru and Bolivia. (18. - 21.9.2013): Black Forest Farmer Forum, Lake Constance Rural Movement, Farmer Market and alternative farm property and alternative farming model near Freiburg.
